

#### I. NOTES ON THE LITURGY.

#### I .- THE FESTIVALS.

The Festivals of the Church are not all celebrated with the same degree of solemnity; the words <code>Double</code>, <code>Semi-Double</code>, and <code>Simple</code>, found in the Calendar, show the degree of solemnity with which each feast is celebrated. The order is as follows: <code>double</code> of the first class, double of the second class, double major, double, semi-double, and simple. When the office is <code>double</code>, an entire Anthem is said or sung before and after each Psalm; when <code>semi-double</code>, only a word or two are said or sung before the Psalm. A <code>simple</code> has only three lessons at Matins. A <code>feria</code> is a week-day for which no Saint's Office is appointed.

The principal Festivals are doubles of the first class. Some Festivals have an Octave, or succession of eight days on which, with certain exceptions, the Office and Mass of the Feast are said.

#### II, -THE ROMAN MISSAL AND VESPER BOOK.

The prayers, and portions of the Holy Scripture, of which the Mass is composed, are partly always the same and partly different every day. Those that are invariable are contained in what is called the Ordinary of the Mass, at the beginning of the Missal. The parts that are changeable, or proper—viz., the Introits, Collects, Graduals and Tracts, Gospels, Offertories, Secrets, Communions, and Post-Communions—form the subsequent contents. As the Prefaces are not so frequently subject to change, they follow each other in regular succession in the Ordinary of the Mass. In the Calendar, in the first part of this Directory, the proper Mass for each day in the year is indicated.

If a double falls on a Sunday, the Mass of the double is said instead of that of the Sunday, unless it be a Sunday of the first class—viz., the First Sunday of Advent or Lent, Passion, Palm, Easter, Low, Pentecost, and Trinity Sundays—which are never superseded. The Sundays of the second class, which are superseded only by doubles of the first class, are the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th of Advent; Septuagesima, Sexagesima, and Quinquagesima Sundays; and the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th of Lent. The Gospels for Sundays thus superseded are said at the end of the Mass, instead of St. John's Gospel; and a Commemoration of Sunday, by its proper Collect, Secret, and Post-Communion, is made after the Collect, &c., of the Festival.

The Evening Service of the Church is contained in the Vesper-Book. The following is the order of Vespers: Pater noster and Ave Maria being said, the Priest intones the Versicle Deus, in adjutorium meum intende, to which the choir answer by the Response, Domine, ad adjuvandum me festina, with the Gloria Patri; and when five Psalms, with their Anthems, have been sung, the Priest chants the Little Chapter. Then are sung the Hymn, with its Versicle and Response, and Magnificat with its Anthem, followed by the Prayers

and Commemorations appointed for the day; which, if it be neither a double nor within an Octave, are the Commemorations or Suffrages of the Saints, to be found after the Common Vespers for Sunday.

All these Commemorations are indicated in the Calendar.

Every double has first and second Vespers: the first on the eve of the Festival, the second on the Festival itself. As a double is of higher rank than an ordinary Sunday, which is only a semi-double, it often happens that the Vespers are not of Sunday, but of some double that falls on it, or on the ensuing day, and in that case a Commemoration only is made of Sunday.

#### II. THE ANGELUS.

In Catholic countries, and in many places at home, the Angelus Bell is rung in the morning, at noon, and in the evening at sunset to honour the Mystery of the Incarnation. To gain the indulgences attached to this Devotion the Angelus must be said kneeling, except on Saturday evening and Sunday, when it is said standing. In Paschal Time, that is from Holy Saturday at noon till the Saturday before Trinity Sunday at noon, inclusively, the Regina Cali is said instead of the Angelus. This prayer is always said standing. Those who do not know the Regina Cali may gain the indulgences by saying the Angelus; but it must be said standing during Paschal Time. For the convenience of the Faithful is appended a translation of the Regina Cali taken from the Raccolla (p. 165).

Queen of Heaven, rejoice. Alleluia.

For He whom thou wast made worthy to bear, Alleluia,

Hath arisen as He said. Alleluia. Pray for us to our God. Alleluia.

V. Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary. Alleluia.

R. For the Lord hath risen indeed. Alleluia.

Let us pray.

O God, who through the resurrection of Thy Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, has vouchsafed to give joy to the whole world, grant us, we beseech Thee, that through the intercession of the Virgin Mary, His Mother, we may obtain the joys of eternal life. Through the same our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

## III. INDULGENCES GRANTED TO THE FAITHFUL IN SCOTLAND.

An Indulgence is a remission of the whole, or a part, of the temporal punishment that often remains to be suffered for sins which, as to their guilt and eternal punishment, have been already remitted. For the effect and validity of an Indulgence, it is not only necessary that there be a competent authority in him who grants it, and a just cause or motive for the grant, but it is also necessary, on the part of him who obtains it, that he renounce and be sincerely sorry for all his sins, that he be in the state of grace,

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and that he duly perform the conditions prescribed. Of Indulgences, some are called plenary, which, when fully obtained, remit the whole of the temporal punishment that remained due on account of past sins; others are for a certain number of years or days, which, when fully obtained, remit as much of the temporal vunishment as would have been discharged by the performance of so many years

or days of Canonical Penance.

The conditions for most of the Plenary Indulgences include But for those who go to confession once a week, their weekly confession, if they remain in a state of grace, will suffice (Decrees of Sept. 9, 1763, and Nov. 15, 1841); and, by a Decree of June 12, 1822, a Plenary Indulgence granted for a festival may be gained if the confession be made a week before. Moreover, by a Decree of Oct. 6, 1870, it will for any Indulgence suffice that the confession, and also the Holy Communion, be made on the day before that which is appointed for the Indulgence.

The Holy See has been graciously pleased to grant to the Faithful in Scotland the following Plenary Indulgences, on certain condi-

tions after specified :-

1st, From the Feast of St. Thomas, Apostle, 21st of December, to

the first Sunday after the Epiphany, inclusively.

2nd, From Ash-Wednesday to the second Sunday of Lent, inclusively.

3rd, During the time appointed in each Diocese for complying

with Easter duties.

4th, From Pentecost Sunday to Sunday after Corpus Christi.

5th, From Sunday before the Feast of SS. Peter and Paul to the Octave day.

6th, From Sunday before the Feast of the Assumption to the Octave day.

7th, From Sunday before the Feast of All Saints to the Octave day. 8th, On the Feast of St. Andrew, and during the Octave.

### The following are the CONDITIONS on which the Faithful may gain these Indulgences.

1st, That within the time prescribed they approach to the Sacra-

ments of Penance and the Holy Eucharist.

2nd, That on the day of their Communion they offer up some prayers to God for the happy state of the whole Church of Christ; for its Supreme Pastor, the Bishop of Rome; for peace and concord between all Christian Princes; for the exaltation and propagation of the Holy Catholic Faith, especially in our own country; and for the eternal salvation of all Christians.

3rd, That, if they have an opportunity, they visit within the limited time some church or oratory, and pray to God as has been

mentioned before.

4th, That, if their circumstances enable them, they perform some works of mercy.

#### IV. INDULGENCE FOR THE LITANY OF THE B. VIRGIN.

On the 6th May, 1879, His Holiness granted the Apostolic Benediction, and an Indulgence of seven years on each Saturday, and on the Feasts of the Blessed Virgin, to the Faithful of England and Scotland who shall recite or sing the Litany of the Blessed Virgin in any church in either country.

#### V. THE DEVOTIONS FOR THE MONTH OF OCTOBER.

For the October Devotions, prescribed by Decrees of 20th August, 1885, etc., the following Indulgences have been granted: 1st, seven years and seven quarantines each time one joins in the public recital of the Rosary and Litany of the B. Virgin (or, being legitimately impeded, says them privately), and prays according to the intentions of the Pope; 2nd, a Plenary Indulgence to those who, having done this at least ten times, confess and communicate; 3nd, a Plenary Indulgence to all who, on the Feast of the Rosary or within the Octave, confess, communicate, and pray in some church to God and the B. Virgin according to the intention of His Holiness; 4th, seven years and seven quarantines, each time, for the recital of the prayer to St. Joseph enjoined by the Encyclical of 15th August, 1889.

Prayer to St. Joseph. Commanded by Leo XIII. to be recited every day throughout the Catholic world during the month of

October.

To thee, O blessed Joseph, we fly in our tribulation, and while imploring the help of thy most holy spouse, thy protection also with confidence we crave. By that affection which united thee with the Immaculate Virgin, Mother of God, and by the fatherly love with which thou didst embrace the Child Jesus, we humbly supplicate thee to look down benignantly on the heritage which Christ Jesus purchased with His blood, and in thy might and

power to succour us in our necessities.

Defend, O most provident Guardian of the Divine Family, the chosen race of Jesus Christ; keep us, most loving Father, from all taint of error and corruption; do thou from heaven, as our most powerful Protector, stand graciously by us in this conflict with the powers of darkness; and as of old thou didst rescue the Child Jesus in the imminent peril of His life, so now defend the Holy Church of God from hostile wiles and all adversity, and through thy never-failing patronage so shield each one of us, that guided by thy example and supported by thy aid, we may live in holiness, piously die, and attain eternal happiness in heaven. Amen.

N.B.—By a quarantine Indulgence is meant the remission of so much of the future penalty (poena) of sin as is the equivalent of keeping a Lent according to the strict discipline of the Church,

## VI. PRAYERS ENJOINED BY HIS HOLINESS, POPE LEO XIII.

To be said kneeling after Low Mass.

Hail Mary, three times. Then Salve Regina.

Hail, Holy Queen, Mother of Merey; Hail, our life, our sweetness and our hope. To Thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve; to Thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this vale of tears. Turn then, most gracious Advocate, Thine eyes of mercy towards us; and after this our exile, show unto us the Blessed Fruit of Thy womb, Jesus; O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary.

V. Pray for us, O Holy Mother of God.

R. That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.

#### Let us Pray.

O God, our refuge and our strength, look with favour on Thy people who cry to Thee; and through the intercession of the Glorious and Immaculate Virgin Mary, Mother of God, and Blessed Joseph her Spouse, of Thy Blessed Apostles Peter and Paul, and of all the Saints, mercifully and graciously hear the prayers which we pour forth for the conversion of sinners, and for the freedom and exaltation of our Holy Mother the Church. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

St. Michael the Archangel defend us in the day of battle; be our safeguard against the wickedness and snares of the devil;—"the Lord command him," we humbly pray;—and do thou, O Prince of the Heavenly Host, by the power of God, thrust into hell Satan and the other wicked spirits who go about the

world for the destruction of souls. Amen.

His Holiness, Leo XIII., grants an Indulgence of 300 days to all who recite these prayers as above.

## VII. ASSOCIATION FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE FAITH.

This Institution assists by prayers and alms the Missionaries who are engaged in preaching the Gospel. The prayers are a Pater and Ave each day. It will suffice to say for this purpose the Pater and Ave of our morning and night prayers, adding the aspiration, Saint Francis Xuvier, pray for us. The alms is only one halfpenny per week. One member in ten acts as collector, and pays in the amount to another member, who has ten such collections to receive. Donations are likewise thankfully received. Two committees, one in Paris, and the other at Lyons, distribute the alms to the Missions. A return of the sums received, and of their appropriation, is inserted annually in the Annuls of the Propagation of the Faith. This collection, to the reading of which each member is entitled, appears six times a year. One copy is supplied to every ten members,

PLENARY INDUIGENCES.—On the 3rd of May (the Anniversary of the foundation of the Society); the 3rd of December (the feast of St. Francis Xavier); the feasts of the Epiphany, Annunciation, and Assumption—or any day within the Octave of these five festivals; the 29th of September (the feast of St. Michael); all the feasts of the Apostles; two days in each month, at the member's option; once a year for the general commemoration of deceased members; once a year for the special commemoration of deceased members of the Council, Committee, or Decade to which he belongs; at the hour of death, provided he invokes the name of Jesus. Children, who have not yet made their first communion, may likewise gain these indulgences. These and the following are applicable to the souls in Purgatory.

Partial Inducences.—300 days every time a member attends the Triduum of the 3rd of May and the 3rd of December; 100 days every time a member recites Our Father and Hail Mary, together with the invocation of St. Francis Xavier; 7 years and 7 quarantines every time a member performs any good work in the interests

of the Society.

FAVOUR OF PRIVILEGED ALTARS.—For every Mass said in the name of a member for a deceased member. For personal privileges

and other special favours to Priests, see the Annals.

Whoever contributes at one time 200 francs (£8), at the least, to establish a permanent fund—even though this sum should be immediately expended on the Missions—shall be regarded as a member in perpetuity and as such enjoy all the privileges and indulgences on performing the other conditions prescribed.

Alms and Donations for the Association are received in Scotland

by any of the Clergy.

#### VIII. EASTER DUTIES AND INDULGENCE.

By a Rescript from the Holy See, dated 27th October, 1896, the Faithful of the Dioceses of St. Andrews and Edinburgh, Glasgow, and Dunkeld, are authorised to satisfy the obligation of the Paschal Communiou, and to gain the Plenary Indulgence, on any day from the first Sunday of Lent to Sunday within the Octave of the Ascension, inclusively; and those of the Diocese of Galloway, of Aberdeen, and of Argyll and the Isles, from the first Sunday of Lent till Low Sunday. This extension is granted for a term of five years.

## IX. FAST AND ABSTINENCE DAYS, AND LENTEN INDULT.

I, -FAST DAYS ON ONE MEAL.

1st, All the days in Lent except Sundays. 2nd, The Wednesdays and Fridays of Advent.

3rd, The Ember-Days occurring in the four seasons of the year, being the Wednesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays after the first Sun-

day of Lent, after Pentecost Sunday, after the third Sunday of September, and after the third Sunday of Advent. But if the 14th of September, or the 13th of December, fall upon a Wednesday, the Ember-Days of that season are kent the week following.

4th, The Vigils or Eves of Pentecost Sunday, of SS. Peter and Paul, of the Assumption, of All Saints, of St. Andrew, and of

Christmas.

N.B.—When a Fast-Day falls upon a Sunday, it is to be observed on the Saturday before.

#### II. - DAYS OF ABSTINENCE.

On which the Church prohibits the use of Flesh Meat.

1st, All Fast-Days, unless a Dispensation be granted for some days in Lent.

2nd, All the Sundays in Lent, unless a Dispensation be granted. 3rd, The Fridays throughout the year. But if Christmas-Day falls on a Friday, it is not a day of abstinence.

#### III.—LENTEN REGULATIONS FOR 1897.

#### By authority of the Holy See

### 1. For those who are bound to fast.

1. Flesh meat is allowed at the chief meal on all days, except Wednesdays and Fridays, Ember Saturday, and the last four days of Holy Week,

2. Eggs, milk, butter, butterine or margarine, and cheese, are allowed every day without exception, both at the chief meal and, in small quantity, at collation. [Butterine is now allowed throughout the year.]

3. Dripping and lard are allowed at the chief meal and, in small quantity, at the collation every day in Lent except Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. [This permission is now extended to all fast

and abstinence days throughout the year. ]

4. Suet is allowed only when flesh meat is allowed.

### 2. For those who are not bound to fast.

1. Persons under 21, or those who on account of old age, bad health, or laborious employment, are not bound to fast, may eat flesh meat

at every meal on days when it is allowed.

2. On such days, persons not exempted as above, but obtaining a dispensation on account of weak health or the like, may eat flesh meat once only, unless dispensed also from abstinence.

#### 3. For all.

1. On Sundays flesh meat, eggs, etc., may be taken by fasters and non-fasters alike at every meal; but fish and flesh cannot be taken at the same meal.

2. The prohibition of fish and flesh at the same meal applies to all days in Lent, as also to all fast-days throughout the year, and is binding on both fasters and non-fasters.

N.B. The Holy Father earnestly exhorts the Faithful to compensate for these relaxations, granted for very urgent reasons, by other good works, and especially by almsgiving to the poor.

#### X. MARRIAGES.

By the decree of the Council of Trent (Sess. 24, Chap. 10 de Reformat. Matrimonii), the solemnising of Marriage is forbidden from Ash Wednesday till Low Sunday inclusively, and from the first Sunday of Advent till the Feast of the Epiphany inclusively.

The decree of the same Council (*ibid*. Chap. 1) respecting Clandestine Marriages was extended to the whole of Ireland on the 2nd December, 1827; and was consequently in force thirty days afterwards.

Marriage cannot be contracted by persons within the 4th degree of kindred without a Dispensation; and, if attempted, is invalid.—Spiritual kindred, contracted by Baptism or Confirmation, is an impediment.

A "mixed marriage" (that is, a marriage between a Catholic and one who, though baptised, does not profess the Catholic Faith) is unlawful without a Dispensation; and the Dispensation cannot lawfully be given unless for a sufficiently grave reason, and subject to the following conditions: 1. That all the children that may be born of the marriage shall be baptised, and brought up, in the Catholic Faith. 2. That the Catholic party shall have full liberty for the practice of the Catholic religion. 3. That no religious marriage ceremony shall take place elsewhere than before the Catholic Priest.

#### XI. SICK CALLS.

All sick calls should be given in at the Priest's house at a timely hour in the morning. If this reasonable rule were adhered to, it would save the Clergy much unnecessary labour, and the people many disappointments, which they may justly ascribe to their own want of system.

On Saturdays, eves of Holidays, and other days which are generally devoted to the Confessional, the Priest should not, if possible, be called away from this important duty. Unless in cases of necessity, sick calls should not be made on Saturdays or Sundays, when the Clergy have so many other duties to attend to.

It is the duty of the people to conform to whatever regulations may be made by the Clergy, on these and other matters connected with religion, in their respective congregations. All things should be done in order, according to the advice of St. Paul.

When the Priest is called to attend a sick person, everything that he requires for the administration of the Sacraments should be

furnished as decently as possible in the room where the sick person lies—viz, a table covered with a clean linen cloth, on which should be laid a candle, a vessel of holy water with an Asperges, a small vessel of common water for the purification of the Priest's fingers after the administration of the Holy Viaticum, and a napkin for the sick person at the time of Communion. As the Priest generally brings the Blessed Sacrament on these occasions, everything should be so becomingly prepared, according to their means, as to show the great respect of the inmates for Jesus Christ, and the high value they set upon the honour thus rendered to their house in the visit of their Lord and Redeemer.

While the Priest is administering the Viaticum and Extreme Unction, the assistants should devoutly offer up their prayers to God on behalf of the sick person, to implore that he may receive

those Sacraments with the necessary dispositions.

XII. EXTRACTS FROM THE RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISION FOR THE RELIEF OF THE POOR IN SCOTLAND.

Address—Board of Supervision, Edinburgh.

The Board issued a Circular Letter, dated 3rd November, 1864, enclosing rules relating to the "General Register of Poor," and "The Children's Separate Register". Rules I., II., and III. provide for the mode of keeping such Registers by the Inspectors of

Poor in every Parish.

Rule IV.—"The Parochial Board of each Parish or Combination shall before the first January, 1865, name and publicly announce two lawful days in the week on each of which, during one hour to be fixed and announced in like manner by that Board, but not earlier than 9 A.M., nor later than 3 P.M., both 'The General Register' and the 'Children's Separate Register,' directed by Rule V. to be kept, shall be open to inspection at the office of the Inspector of Poor, free of charge, by any known Minister of any religious denomination officiating in the Parish or Combination, and on payment of one shilling on each occasion that he inspects it, by any ratepayer of the Parish or Combination giving his name and address in writing."

RULE VII. - "The particulars relating to each child required to

be entered in the 'Children's Separate Register' are :-

"1st, The name and the age ascertained or presumed. The date at which he or she became chargeable, and whether as an orphan, or as a deserted child, or as a child separated from a parent, or parents, and if so separated, then the reason for such separation.

"2nd, The Religious Denomination — whether Protestant or Roman Catholic—with the grounds for holding the child to be of

the denomination entered in the Register,

"3rd, The name, religious denomination, and place of residence of the parents, or of the last surviving parent of the child, so far as

these are known or can be ascertained.

"4th, The date of any minute of the Parochial Board or Comnittee thereof, directing that the child be sent to the Poorhouse or be boarded out, and when directed to be boarded out, the name, religious denomination, and place of residence of the person with whom the child is boarded, and date of removal thereto; and if the child be registered as a Roman Catholic then the date of intimation sent, in terms of the Board of Supervision's Minute of 13th February, 1862, to the priest of that faith residing nearest to the place where the child is to be boarded. Also, in like manner, similar entries with reference to every subsequent order for removal, and actual removal of the same child boarded out, from one place or house to another, or from the care of one person to another, from time to time so long as the child is receiving relief.

"5th, The date and the age at which, and the circumstances in consequence of which, the child may have ceased to be chargeable to the Parish or Combination, and the name, residence, and occupation or trade, of the person with whom the child may have been apprenticed, or may have engaged as a servant, while receiving

parochial relief."

RULE VIII.—"In every case in which an orphan or deserted child, or a child separated from its parents, is ordered to be sent to the Poorhouse, the Inspector shall state in the ticket for his, or her, admission, the religious denomination of the child as entered in the 'Child's Separate Register,' and the House Governor of the Poorhouse shall enter the child in the Poorhouse Register as of that denomination; and he shall cause to be delivered on Monday of each week to any known Minister of the religious denomination of any inmate, and who regularly visits, or has been nominated to visit the Poorhouse, for the purpose of instructing the children of his own denomination, a list of all such children then inmates of the Poorhouse, if he applies for it."

## EXTRACT FROM MINUTE OF BOARD OF SUPERVISION, 13TH FEBRUARY, 1862.

"Complaints having been made to the Board that Pauper children, whose parents were Roman Catholics, have been placed by the Parochial Board in Protestant Institutious, to which Roman Catholic Clergymen are denied access, and have been thus brought up Protestants, the Board therefore desire to remind Parochial Boards, that they are bound to take care that the education given by them as a part of the relief which they are required to afford to Pauper children, shall not be so conducted as to counteract the religious instruction which the parents, or surviving parent, may intimate a desire to give to any such child. In the case of children who have no surviving parent, the intention of the parents in this

respect must be inferred to have been to bring up the children in

the religious tenets which they themselves professed.

"In order to acquit themselves of these obligations, Parochial Boards ought to place the younger children of Roman Catholic parents, whom it is desired to board out, in families of the Roman Catholic persuasion, when suitable families of that persuasion can be found in the parish, or within such distance beyond it as the Parochial Board may consider it expedient to send Pauper children. If no such families can be found and the parish has Poorhouse accommodation, then such Roman Catholic children ought to be placed in the Poorhouse, where the Roman Catholic Clergyman has access to them in terms of the Rules and Regulations; but if there be no suitable Roman Catholic family in which the child can be boarded, and the parish be not possessed of Poorhouse a commodation, then special care ought to be taken that wherever the child may be placed, the known Clergyman of the religious persuasion of its parents shall have free access to it, at reasonable hours, for the purpose of imparting religious instruction; and the place of residence of every such child ought to be intimated to the nearest resident Clergyman of the religious persuasion of its parents.

"Where there is a properly conducted Roman Catholic school in the Parish, the child of Roman Catholic parents, who is boarded out, ought to be sent to that school, if it be within a reasonable distance of the Roman Catholic family in which the child is boarded; or if no suitable Roman Catholic family can be found willing to receive it, and there be no Poorhouse accommodation belonging to the Parish, then the child, which must in that case of necessity be boarded in a Protestant family, ought, if possible, to be placed with one which resides within such a moderate distance of a properly conducted Roman Catholic school as will admit of the child's regularly attending that school, and the child should be

required to attend it accordingly."

### Education of Roman Catholic Children.

"The Board are of opinion, that although education is part of the relief which the Parochial Board is bound to provide for pauper children, that Board is not legally bound to subsidise, from the Parochial funds, schools of every different religious denomination to which any of the pauper children and the ratepayers may happen to

belong.

"A parent, or if there be no parent, then a legal guardian is the only person who in the opinion of the Board has a right to determine what religious tenets shall be taught to the child.

In the case of children who have no surviving parent, the intention of their parents in this respect must be inferred to have been to bring up their children in the tenets which they themselves, or the last survivor of them, professed.

"The Board arc of opinion that the Parochial Board ought not to object to pay for the children sent by desire of their parents, or legal guardians, to an existing and properly taught Roman Catholic school, similar fees to those which may be usually paid for pauper children at other schools in the same Parish."

## Rules and Regulations for the Management of Poorhouses,

By these rules the following, amongst other, provisions are made:— The keeping of the Register of Inmates by the House Governor, and to enter therein the name, religious persuasion, etc., of every inmate.

RULE I. provides "that inmates who refuse to attend on account of their religious principles" shall be exempted from attendance at morning and evening prayers, and divine service on Sundays.

RULE II.—"Any regular Minister of the religious persuasion of any inmate shall at any time in the day, on the request of any inmate, be allowed by the House Governor to enter the Poorhouse for the purpose of affording religious assistance to such inmate, or for the purpose of instructing his child or children in the principles

of his religion."

RULE LII.—"When a regular Minister of any religious persuasion shall request permission to visit members of his congregation who may be immates of the Poorhouse, orders shall be given for his admission at such hours as the House Governor may consider proper; and if such immates, or several of them, desire it, arrangement shall be made for assembling them in some convenient apartment where religious instruction may be given or divine service conducted with decorum, and apart from the other immates."

RULE LIII.—No work except the necessary household work shall

be performed by the inmates on Sabbath-day.

RULE LIV.—No work except as above shall be required from any poor person, who shall be entered in the Register as professing the Roman Catholic religion, on any of the following days observed as Holidays in the Roman Catholic Church, that is to say, the 1st and 6th days of January, the 17th and 25th days of March, the 29th day of June, the 15th day of August, the 1st day of November, Ascension Day and Corpus Christi Day.\*

#### REFORMATORY AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

#### I. REFORMATORY SCHOOLS.

By the Reformatory Schools Act, 29 and 30 Vict., c. 117, section 16 (Aug. 10, 1866), it is enacted—

<sup>\*</sup> Christmas and St. Andrew's day (not mentioned in the above Rule) are Holydays of Obligation in Scotland, but the 17th and 25th days of March are not.

That the parent, step-parent, or guardian-or, if there be no parent, sten-parent, or guardian, then the god-parent or nearest adult relative-of any youthful offender sent or about to be sent to a school which is not conducted in accordance with the religious persuasion to which the offender belongs, may apply to the court by whom such offender was sentenced to be sent to a Reformatory School; or to the visiting justices of the prison to which the offender was committed by that court; or to the justices or magistrate by whom the offender was sentenced to be sent to a Reformatory School (or justices or magistrate having the like jurisdiction); with request to send or remove such offender to a Certified Reformatory School conducted in accordance with the offender's religious persuasion: and the court, visiting justices, justices, or magistrate (as the case may be) shall, upon proof of such offender's religious persuasion, comply with the request of the applicant, provided-1, that the application is made before the offender has been sent to a Certified Reformatory School, or within thirty days after the arrival at such School; and 2, that the managers of the School named are shown to be willing to receive the offender.

#### II. INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

By the Industrial Schools Act, 29 and 30 Vict., c. 118, Section

20 (Aug. 10, 1866), it is enacted-

That, if the parent, step-parent, or guardian-or, if there be no parent, step-parent, or guardian, then the god-parent or nearest adult relative-of a child sent, or about to be sent, to a school, not conducted in accordance with the religious persuasion to which the child belongs, states to the justices or magistrate by whom the order of detention has been made or is about to be made (or to two justices or a magistrate having the like jurisdiction), that he, or she, objects to the child being sent to, or detained in the school specified, or about to be specified, in the order; and names another Certified Industrial School in Great Britain which is conducted in accordance with the child's religious persuasion, and signifies his, or her, desire that the child be sent thereto; then the justices or magistrate shall, upon proof of such child's religious persuasion, comply with the request of the applicant, provided-1, That the application is made before the child has been sent to a Certified Industrial School, or within thirty days after its arrival at such school; and 2, that the managers of the school are shown to be willing to receive the child.

N.B.—With regard both to Reformatory and to Industrial Schools, when thirty days after the offender's or child's entrance into a non-Catholic School have passed, application for transfer to a Catholic Reformatory or Industrial School can be made

only to the Home Secretary. The following is the form of application:-

"To the Right Hon. the Secretary of State for the Home Department.—Right Hon. Sir, I, the undersigned, being the (state relationship, or, in default thereof, whether god-purent or guardian, striking out from 'and' to 'kin') and nearest adult relative, or next of kin of ....., an offender aged...years, not belonging to the Established Church, but to the Roman Catholic Religion, and now under detention in the Certified School at....., apply to you to order, pursuant to the Statute 29 and 30 Vict., cap. 117, the transfer of the aforesaid......... to the Roman Catholic Certified School established at.........

"I offer the annexed proofs that the aforesaid ......belongs to the Roman Catholic Religion, and that the Manager of the

School is willing to receive the Offender.

Form of approval of Manager :-

"I, the undersigned, being the Manager of the Roman Catholic Certified School established at ....., hereby declare that I am willing to receive into this Institution the Offender....referred to in the foregoing Petition.

"Signed this ...... day of ....., at ...., in the parish of ....., in the county of ...... Manager."

Form of Certificate of Baptism :-

West Thorn, Parkhead, Glasgow.

There are Catholic Certified Industrial Schools for boys at 72 Abercromby Street, Glasgow; Slatefield Street, Glasgow; and Tranent; for girls at 74 Abercromby Street, Glasgow, and Nazareth House, Claremont Street, Aberdeeu.—The United Industrial School, Edinburgh, is expressly designed for Catholic boys as well as Protestants.

#### XIII. THE PIOUS ASSOCIATION OF THE HOLY FAMILY.

# A. STATUTES OF THE UNIVERSAL ASSOCIATION OF FAMILIES CONSECRATED TO THE HOLY FAMILY OF NAZARETH.

1. The object of this Pious Association is that Christian Families may consecrate themselves to the Holy Family of Nazareth, may devote themselves to its veneration, and may set it before themselves as an example, honouring it in presence of its picture or representation with daily prayer, and forming their lives on the model of the sublime virtues of which it has given an example to every grade of society, and especially to those who labour.

2. The Pious Association has its centre in Rome, and its President and Protector is the Cardinal Vicar for the time being of His Holiness. Assisted by the Secretary of the Sacred Congregation of Rites, and by two other Prelates chosen by himself, and also by an ecclesiastic as Secretary, he directs the Association in all parts of the world, solicitously providing for the preservation of its spirit and character, and for its continual propagation.

3. In every Diocese and Apostolic Vicariate, the Ordinary, in order to promote the Association among the faithful, will make use of an Ecclesiastic appointed by himself under the title of "Diocesan

Director".

4. The Diocesan Directors will place themselves in communication with the Parish Priests, who alone have the power to enrol families in their respective parishes. In May of each year the Parish Priests will forward to the Diocesan Director, and the latter (under the orders of the Ordinary) will send on to the central office in Rome, the number of families newly inscribed in the Pious Association.

5. The Consecration of Families shall be made according to the form approved and prescribed by Pope Leo XIII. This consecration may be performed either by each family in private, or by the families assembled in the Parish Church, in presence of the Parish

Priest or his delegate.

6. There shall be a representation (picture or image), of the Holy Family of Nazarcth in every enrolled family, and the members of each family, at least once a day, in the evening if possible, shall pray in common before such representation. For this purpose is especially recommended the Prayer approved by His present Holiness (LEO XIII.); and also the frequent use of the three ejaculations:—\*

Jesus, Mary and Joseph, I give you my heart and my soul. Jesus, Mary and Joseph, assist me in my last agony. Jesus, Mary and Joseph, may I breathe out my soul in peace with you.

<sup>\*</sup> An Indulgence of 300 days may be gained, each time, for these three ejaculations; and 100 days for any one of them. (PIUS VII., 28th April, 1807.)

7. The representation of the Holy Family may be either that mentioned in the letter of Pope PIUS IX., of holy memory, dated January 5th, 1870, or any other which represents our Lord Jesus Christ in the hidden Life which He led with His Mother the Blessed Virgin and with her most chaste spouse St. Joseph. The Ordinary, according to the decree of the Council of Trent, has the power to forbid such representations as are at variance with the idea of the Association.

8. Families enrolled in the Association enjoy the Indulgences and spiritual advantages granted by the Sovereign Pontiffs, as

indicated in the card of membership.

9. The Cardinal Protector with his Council shall draw up and publish a Regulation containing detailed provision for the better working of the Association, and, in particular, indicating its proper Feasts, the day of the titular Feast, the day of the annual general renewal of the Act of Consecration, the meetings to be held, etc.

## B. INDULGENCES AND PRIVILEGES GRANTED TO THE PIOUS ASSOCIATION OF THE HOLY FAMILY.

#### I .- PLENARY INDULGENCES.

The members of the Association of the Holy Family, of either sex, who, having confessed their sins, shall receive the Holy Eucharist, and devoutly visit a Parish Church, or a public Oratory, and there pray for some space of time for Our intention, may gain a Plenary Indulgence on the following days viz.:—

I. On the day on which they shall enter the Association, making their Consecration according to the Form approved by Our Congregation of Rites and given at the end of this summary.

II. On the day on which (according to the custom of the locality where the Association exists) is held the general meeting for the

renewal of the Consecration of the Associates.

III. On the following Festivals, viz:—The Nativity, Circumcision, Epiphany, Resurrection, and Ascension of Our Lord; the Immaculate Conception, the Nativity, the Annunciation, the Purification, and the Assumption of Our Lady; the Feast of St. Joseph (March 19th), the Patronage of St. Joseph (the third Sunday after Easter), and the Espousals of Our Lady (January 23rd.)

IV. On the titular Feast of the Association.

V. On one day of each month at the choice of the members, provided that during the month they recite the prescribed prayers in family worship before a representation of the Holy Family.

VI. At the hour of death, if (not being able to confess and communicate) they are truly sorry for their sins and invoke the Holy Name of Jesus either vocally, or at least (if they cannot speak) in will and desire.

#### II .- PARTIAL INDULGENCES.

I. The members of the Association of the Holy Family of either

sex, who, being at least interiorly sorry for their sins, shall visit the Parish Church in which the Association is established, or any Church or Shrine, and shall pray to God for the welfare of Christianity, may gain a Partial Indulgence of seven years and seven times forty days, on the Feasts of the Visitation, the Presentation, and the Patronage of Our Lady; on any day on which with contrite heart they say the prescribed prayers before a representation of the Holy Family in common family worship in their own family (which must be enrolled); and on the days on which they shall be present at any of the meetings.

II. They may also gain an Indulgence of 300 days, as often as with contrite heart they recite the following Prayer (in any

language) before a representation of the Holy Family :-

#### PRAYER.

FOR DAILY RECITATION BEFORE A REPRESENTATION OF THE HOLY FAMILY.

O most loving Jesus, who by Thy ineffable virtues and by the example of Thy domestic life didst consecrate the Family which Thou didst choose on earth; in Thy clemency look down upon this household humbly prostrate before Thee and imploring Thy mercy. Remember that this family belongs to Thee, for to Thee we have in a special way dedicated and devoted ourselves. Look upon us in Thy loving-kindness, preserve us from every danger, give us help in the time of need, and grant us the grace to persevere to the end in the imitation of Thy Holy Family; that having revered Thee and loved Thee faithfully on earth, we may bless and praise Thee cternally in heaven.

O Mary, most sweet Mother, to thy intercession we have recourse,

knowing that Thy Divine Son will hear thy prayers.

And do thou, O glorious Patriarch St. Joseph, assist us by thy powerful mediation, and offer by the hands of Mary our prayers to Jesus.

Members who either through sickness or for any other reason cannot recite this prayer, may gain the same Indulgence by saying devoutly five Our Fathers and five Hail Marys with the "Glory be to the Father".

III. They may gain an Indulgence of 200 days once a day, by saying (in any language) the ejaculation—"Jesus, Mary, and

Joseph, enlighten us, help us, and save us!"

IV. Members may gain an Indulgence of 100 days by working to promote the en elment of Christian families in this pious and

universal Association.

V. Members may gain an Indulgence of 60 days, each time, by the following good works: 1. Devoutly assisting at the Holy Sacrifice and other divine offices in the Parish Church in which the Association is established. 2. Saying five Our Fathers and five Hail Marys for deceased members. 3. Putting an end to family dissensions, or causing them to be made up. 4. Endeavouring to bring back to the ways of salvation a family which has strayed. 5. Teaching Christian doctrine to boys or girls. 6. Doing any other good work by which the Association benefits.

All these Indulgences, whether plenary or partial, may be

applied to the souls in Purgatory.

#### C. PRIVILEGES.

#### I .- FOR ALL ASSOCIATES.

Masses said for deceased Associates at any altar, shall benefit their souls in the same way as if said at a Privileged Altar.

#### II .- FOR PARISH PRIESTS.

1. The Privileged Altar on three days in each week, provided they do not already enjoy that privilege. 2. The faculty (except in Rome itself) of blessing Rosaries, Crosses, Crucifixes, statuettes and medals, and of applying to them the Indulgences usually given by the Sovereign Pontiff; but only for members of the Association, on the day of enrolment, or on that of the solemn renewal of consecration.

## FORM OF CONSECRATION OF A CHRISTIAN FAMILY TO THE HOLY FAMILY.

O Jesus, our most loving Redeemer, who didst come into the world to enlighten it by Thy teaching and by Thy example, and who didst will to pass the greater part of Thy mortal life in the poor cottage of Nazareth, in humble subjection to Mary and Joseph, thus sanctifying that Family which was to be the model of all Christian families: graciously receive this family, which dedicates and consecrates itself to Thee this day. Do Thou protect us, do Thou watch over us! Do Thou bestow upon us Thy holy fear, peace, concord, and Christian love; that so, by the imitation of Thy Family as our pattern and model, we may each and all obtain everlasting happiness.

O Mary, loving Mother of Jesus and our Mother, by thy gracious intercession make this humble dedication acceptable to Jesus, and

obtain for us His graces and blessings.

St. Joseph, holy Guardian of Jesus and Mary, assist us by thy prayers in all our spiritual and temporal necessities; so that, with Mary and with thee, we may for all eternity bless and thank our Divine Redeemer, Jesus.

#### XIV. CELEBRATIONS FOR DECEASED CLERGYMEN.

By a rule immemorially observed in the Mission of Scotland, every Missionary belonging to it offered up three Masses for the soul of each Bishop or Priest who died attached to the Mission. In consequence of the greatly increased number of Clergymen, this

rule was modified in 1847 by the Vicars Apostolic, by authority of the Holy See, in so far that every Missionary was bound to celebrate thrice for those belonging to his own District, and once for those who had served in another District. Lastly, in virtue of a Papal Rescript of 20th June, 1879, the rule was again altered by the Archtoshops and Bishops, to the effect that every Missionary is obliged to celebrate thrice for a deceased Missionary of his own Diocese, and once for one of any other Diocese.

# XVII. VICARS APOSTOLIC IN SCOTLAND.

FROM THE EXTINCTION OF THE HIERARCHY IN 1603 TILL ITS RESTORATION IN 1878.

1. The ancient Hierarchy ended with JAMES BETOUN, Abp. of Glasgow who died at Paris on the 25th April, 1603, aged 79. After being subjected to the jurisdiction of the Archpriests and first Vicar-Apostolic of England to the jurisdiction of the Archpriests and birt Vicar-Apostone of England till 1623, and afterwards to local Prefects of the Mission, the Clergy were incorporated into a missionary body by decree of *Propaganda*, 1653, and governed by the following *Prefects-Apostolic*:—WILLIAM BANNATNE (or *Bellenden*), 1653-61; ALEXANDER DUNBAR (or *Winster*), 1662-68, 1672-94; and JOHN WALKER (or *Ross*), 1668-71. In May, 1694, a Scottish *Vicariate-Apostolic* was established. This was divided into two *Districts*, the *Lowland* and Highland, in February, 1731; and these into three, the Eastern, Western, and Northern, by Papal Rescript of 13th February, 1827. This last arrangement remained in force till the re-establishment of the Hierarchy by the Apostolic Letter Ex supremo Apostolatus apice, 4th March, 1878.

The Sec of St. Andrews was founded before 900; erected into a Metropolitan Sec by Bull of Sixtus IV., 17th August, 1472; and was vacant for 307 years, from the execution at Stirling of John Hamilton, 8th Archbishop, on 7th April, 1571, till the restoration of the Hierarchy in 1878.

# Diocese of Argyll and the Isles.

Comprising Counties of Argyll and Inverness (south of a line drawn from the northern extremity of Loch Luing to the junction of the Counties of Inverness, Aberdeen and Banff); the Islands of Bute and Arran, and the Hebrides.

The See of Argyll was founded about 1200, being disjoined from the Diocese of Dunkeld; and was vacant for more than three centuries. James Hamilton was appointed to the See on 14th July, 1553, but was probably never consecrated.

The See of the Isles (Insularum, or Sodorensis) is said to have been founded about 447 by St. Patrick, who consecrated Germanus, its first Bishop; was united to Man till the end of the 14th century; and was vacant for 325 years, from the death of Roderick Maclean in 1553.

Schools of the Archdiocese.—The number of Teachers in the Mission Schools is as follows:—25 Head Masters, 123 Head Mistresses, 84 Certificated and qualified male Assistants, 351 Certificated and qualified Female Assistants. In addition to these, there are employed in the Mission Schools 249 Pupil Teachers (44 Male and 205 Female), and 63 Candidates (16 Male and 47 Female). In the Upper and Middle Class Schools and the Institutions there are 107 Teachers engaged, making the total on the Teaching Staff of the Archdiocese 1002.

## PART IV.

## I. EVENTS, 1895-96.

Dec. 22nd, 1895.—Opening of St. Francis Church, Glasgow.

This magnificent structure was completed this year by the addition of new chancel and side chapels. The total length of the Church interiorly is now 175 feet. The new chancel has a depth of 38 feet. It is 38 feet in width at the chancel arch. From this arch is suspended a great rood of carved oak, with figures of Our Lady and St. John coloured and gilt. From this point the planum is reached by seven steps. The chancel is then 24 feet in width. Square at the base, it becomes apsidal in form above the reredos of the high altar. The apse is lit by five two-light traceried windows, intended for stained glass afterwards. The high altar of Caen stone is very chaste in design, The altar-table rests upon four clustered marble columns. The antependium is divided into three panels, the centre containing the arms of the Order, the side panels containing adoring angels bearing scrolls with the motto of the Order "Deus meus, et omnia" in raised gilt letters. The reredos fills the whole width of the chancel, divided on each side of the massive tabernacle into three panels filled in with coloured marbles, and upon its cresting are placed four angels holding shields. Above the tabernacle rises the throne for exposition, supported by two exquisitely carved angels with extended wings. Over the throne is the massive baldachinum supported on four marble columns, and rising to a height of 42 feet above the floor level. The space at each side of the baldachinum is filled in with adoring angels. The reredos is flanked on each side with two crocheted arches with cusped headings; the steps to the throne mount from these. They are concealed by rich crimson plush hangings. The six massive candelabra, crucifix and vases in proportion, add to the majestic simplicity of the altar, which is seen to advantage from the end of the nave. Two elaborate lamps are suspended from wrought iron cranes at each side of the apse.

The Lady Chapel is at the gospel side of the chancel and raised from the nave by four steps, and separated from the chancel by a lofty pointed arch. The altar slab rests upon four

marble columns, and the antependium, divided into three panels, represents the mystery of the Annunciation. The reredos is a masterpiece of art. The lower portion above the super-altars is carved with fleur-delys in high relief-and the bracket to support the crucifix is richly carved, and below it is a panel containing the five wounds, being the wish of the donor, a Belgian lady from Malines (R.I.P.). The upper portion consists of a magnificent panel, richly carved with adoring angels around the flaming rays, which form the background of Our Lady. This panel is surmounted by a cusped canopy with pinnacles and crockets. The statue is of carved oak, richly decorated with gold and colour. It is the Franciscan type of the Immaculate Conception. This panel is flanked on each side by two carved niches, with canopies and crockets-containing the statues of St. Joachim and St. Anne. The rose window has been so designed that it forms part of the reredos and produces a charming effect. This altar is one of the best which has proceeded from the fertile brain of the architect, P. P. Pugin, Esq. candelabra and vases are of the same massive character as the rest. On the epistle side of the chancel is the chapel of St. Authory of Padua, which is also a chaste specimen of art. The antependium is divided into three panels, with carved

emblems of Poverty, Chastity and Obedience.

In the centre of the reredos rises a massive canopied niche with clustered columns of marble. This niche contains a beautiful stone statue of the Saint. In the lower part of this niche is formed a throne for the exposition of the blessed Sacrament, which takes place at this altar every Tuesday morning. On each side of the central niche is a panel carved in high relief, with a scene from the life of the great "Wonder Worker" of the Franciscan order. The nave and aisles were renovated and painted before the opening. The effect of this interior is now very striking, the simplicity of its lines, the lofty roof and the new altars in the distance leave an impression of grandeur not easily expressed in words. The opening of the completed Church took place on Sunday, 22nd December, 1895. The first opening, in June, 1881, was graced by the presence of the Cardinal Archbishop of Westminster, Cardinal Manning, and the Fathers were desirous that his successor should also inaugurate the second opening. His Eminence Cardinal Vaughan arrived in Glasgow the evening before, and was the guest of the Fathers at the Friary. The Very Rev. A. Finlay, S.J., F.R.U.I., the preacher of the evening, arrived the same day from Dublin. On Sunday the Church, seated for 1500, was well filled by a fashionable congregation. Solemn high mass coram cardinale was sung by His Lordship the Right Rev. Bishop Maguire, Bishop-Auxiliary of Glasgow, Fr. J. B. Macluskey, St. John's, being assistant priest, Fr. O'Brien, Crosshill, deacon, and Fr. Duperier, St. Vincent's, sub-deacon. Fr. Edmund, O.S.F., was Master of

Ceremonies. His Eminence Cardinal Vaughan occupied a throne on the gospel side. The deacons at the throne were Canon McBrearty, Govan, and Canon McFarlane, Partick. The following clergy were present in the sanctuary: Very Rev. Canon Mackintosh, Kinning Park; Very Rev. Canon McKay, Coatbridge; Very Rev. Canon Cameron, Maryhill; Very Rev. Canon Condon, St. Patrick's, Glasgow; Very Rev. Canon Carmichael, St. Mary's; Very Rev. Canon Dyer, Springburn; Very Rev. Canon Macnamara, Pollokshaws; Very Rev. Kentigern Milne, O.S.B., Prior of Fort-Augustus; Very Rev. Fr. John, C.P., and Fr. Justin, C.P., St. Mungo's; Very Rev. Fr. Edwin, O.S.F., Very Rev. Fr. Cuthbert, O.S.F., Manchester; Very Rev. Fr. Aidan, London; Frs. Joseph, Richard, Ephram, O.S.F., Frs. Lawson and Payne, S.J., and a large number of the secular clergy. By a special indult from the Holy See, the mass sung was the Immaculate Conception B.V.M. The choir was under the direction of Fr. Wulstan, O.S.F. His Eminence preached from the text, "This is eternal life to know the one true and living God, and Jesus Christ whom he hath sent".

In the evening solemn vespers of the Immaculate Conception were sung, after which the Very Rev. Fr. Finlay, S.J., of Dublin, preached from the text, "Hearken, my dearest brethren; hath not God chosen the poor in the world, rich in faith and heirs to the kingdom which God hath promised to them that love him." S. James ii. 5. Solemn pontifical benediction was given by his Eminence Cardinal Vaughan; Dr. Hackett and Fr. Mullen being deacon and sub-deacon. The music of the benediction service was by Fr. Turner, O.S.B., the choir being the same as

at the high mass.

The stone altars and carving are from the studio of Messrs. Boulton & Son, Cheltenham, and the metal work from Messrs. Hardman & Co., Birmingham. The church is a lasting monument of the skill and artistic talent of the eminent

architect, P. P. Pugin, Esq., Westminster.

17th March.—Laying the Foundation Stone of St. Patrick's Church, Glasgow.

The memorial stone of this new church was laid on Tucsday, St. Patrick's Day. The church is being built on a site at the corner of North and William Streets, at some distance from the old church and schools. A presbytery is being built at the east end of the block. Internally the church is 134 feet long, 60 feet wide, and the nave has a width of 30 feet. The width is 73. The church when completed will accommodate one thousand persons. The architect is Mr. Pugin, of Westminster, and the contractors for building Messrs. Devlin and Son.

3rd May.—New Pulpit in the Church of the Sacred Heart, Edinburgh.

On this day a beautiful and costly marble pulpit, an offering to this Church from the congregation of the Sacred Heart and other friends, on occasion of the golden Jubilee of Father Whyte as a member of the Society of Jesus, was solemnly opened. At 11 a.m. there was High Mass, and Father Whyte preached, taking this opportunity to thank the congregation for their generous and costly present.

17th May.—Opening of the New Church of St. Patrick at Coatbridge.

The Church was solemnly blessed by the Right Rev. John A. Maguire, Auxiliary Bishop of Glasgow, who also sang the Pontifical Mass. The sermon was preached by the Most Rev. Dr. Clancy, Bishop of Elphin, Ireland. A very large number of priests both Secular and Regular assisted in the Sanctuary, and the number who found accommodation in the building was estimated at over a thousand, many of whom had come from Glasgow and neighbourhood in a special train. The Architects were Messrs. Pugin & Pugin, London. The amount received from Offertory and sale of tickets was close on £500.

17th June.—Opening of St. Margaret's Memorial Church, Dunfermline.

This new Church was solemnly opened on the above date by his Grace the Archbishop of St. Andrews and Edinburgh. Pontifical Mass was sung by the Right Rev. Dr. Smith of Dunkeld. His Lordship Bishop Maguire from Glasgow was also present, while priests from every part of the country filled the Sanctuary. The sermon was preached by the Rev. James McGinnes of St.

Patrick's, Edinburgh.

It is nearly half a century since Dunfermline was formed into a separate Mission in the Eastern Vicariate, the late Dr. Æneas Dawson being placed in charge on July 26th, 1846. For many years he was the only resident priest in Fife. Since that time, churches have been erected in Cupar, Kirkcaldy, St. Andrews, and Lochgelly, and those formed into separate centres. Progress in the parent Mission has been very gradual, but ever on sound lines. Having worshipped during a long series of years in one rented hall after another, the congregation became possessed of a small two-storied house, which was adapted to the uses of a chapel, a school, and a teacher's residence. In 1872, the present school-chapel and Presbytery were built on a site provided by the late A. V. Smith-Sligo of Inzievar. It was only when the last trace of the debt incurred in erecting these

buildings had been wiped out in 1890 that the scheme of raising a fitting church in honour of St. Margaret was entered upon.

"His Grace, the late Archbishop Smith, actuated by his zeal for souls and his devotion to St. Margaret, cherished the hope of providing a becoming church for the people of Dunfermline, and of inducing Catholics throughout Scotland to join in making this church a noble monument in honour of Scotland's glorious Queen and patroness on the occasion of the eighth centenary of her death, 16th November, 1893. These hopes have not been fully realised, but the project has not been abandoned. The church founded by St. Margaret in Dunfermline was begun before 1080, and was finished only in 1115. The congregation is accordingly reconciled to the use of an unfinished church in the hope that one day it will grow into a truly noble structure complete in all parts. The portion already constructed bears witness to the possibilities of the future; but the incubus of debt incurred, £3000, precludes the hope of being able to make one step in advance without substantial aid from Scottish Catholics interested in the good work.

18th June.—Opening of the Church of "Our Lady, Star of the Sea," at Fraserburgh.

The Right Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by a considerable number of the clergy, solemnly opened the above Church on the 18th of June. The Rev. John Paul of Keith celebrated High Mass coram episcopo and his Lordship preached the dedication sermon. The altar is of oak, carved in the workshops of Mr. Beyaert of Bruges, and is the gift of Mr. McGrath, Beauly. A pulpit, also of oak, adorns the sanctuary; it is the gift of Mr. W. Grant, Fraserburgh.

24th June.—Laying of the Foundation Stone of the New Church at Chapelton (Aberdeen).

On the 24th of June the foundation stone of the new Church at Chapelton was solemnly blessed and laid. The stone was blessed by his Lordship the Bishop of Aberdeen, and laid by Miss Fraser, daughter of Mr. Fraser, Elgin, a native of Glenlivet and a generous benefactor to the new Church. A number of priests and a large gathering of people attended the ceremony. The solemn opening of the new Church will probably take place in the early summer of next year.

31st June.—Opening of a New Church at Gorgie, Edinburgh.

The ceremony of the formal opening of the new Church of St. Cuthbert, Slateford Road, Edinburgh, took place on Trinity Sunday, in the presence of a very large congregation.

Pontifical High Mass was celebrated by the Right Rev. Dr. Smith, Bishop of Dunkeld, with Father Whyte, S.J., as Deacon, Father O'Carrol, O.M.I., as Sub-Deacon, and Father Stuart, Assistant The Right Rev. Dr. Macdonald, Archbishop of St. Andrews and Edinburgh, occupied the Throne, and there was present the Right Rev. Dr. Macdonald, Bishop of Aberdeen, and the Right Rev. Dr. Wilkinson, Bishop of Hexham and Newcastle. His Lordship of Aberdeen delivered a discourse on the reasons why Catholics regarded their sacred edifices with such feelings of reverence. At the close of his discourse, Dr. Macdonald thanked, on behalf of the pastor, the lady through whose munificence the edifice had mainly been raised, and also the benefactors who had presented the different altars, pulpit and other adornments. The "Te Deum" was sung at the end of the Mass, and the Papal benediction was imparted to those present, after which Bishon Wilkinson presented the ring of St. Cuthbert to be kissed.

23rd July.—Laying the Foundation Stone of the New College at Blairs.

Seldom has there been a more interesting event in the annals of Blairs College than that of Thursday, the 23rd July. About eighty clergymen from all parts of Scotland assembled for the occasion. The old house has been gradually growing too small for the needs of the College, and the Rector, Canon Chisholm, with the sanction and assistance of the Scotlish Bishops, has got everything in readiness for the erection of a new college at the cost of £8000.

The foundation stone of the west wing of the new college was laid at noon. The ceremony was somewhat marred by the state of the weather. A procession was formed in the church attached to the college. In front were three students, one bearing the Cross, the others carrying candles. Next in order were the students, two abreast, wearing soutane and surplice, and three of their number at different points carrying handsome banners to the Sacred Heart, the Blessed Sacrament, and the Blessed Virgin respectively. His Grace the Archbishop followed, assisted by Rev. Professors Walsh and Miley; and the rear was formed by the bishops and Canon Chisholm, also wearing their full canonicals. Rev. Dr. Fraser discharged the duties of master of ceremonies. The route was through the garden and a play-ground to the site of the new building, which immediately adjoins the semi-detached west block of the present college. Meantime the clergy had assembled in the vicinity of the new works. His Grace blessed and then sprinkled holy water upon the foundation stone and into the cavity over which it was to rest. Canon Chisholm now deposited in the cavity a sealed bottle containing copies of daily newspapers, a number of current coins

of the realm, a list of the priests and the chapels of Scotland arranged in alphabetical order, and a document in Latin, of which the following is the text:—

"X. Kalendas Augusti MDCCCXCVI., Anno XVIIIo. Pontificatus Leonis Papae XIII., quem Deus sospitem atque in-

columem diu conservet.

"Victoria Regina jam amplius LIX. annos feliciter regnante.

"Hic Lapis Primarius.

"Novi Collegii Stae. Mariae de Blairs in Diocesi Aberdonensi a Revmo. in Xto. Aenea Archiepiscopo Ste. Andreae et Edinburgensi assistentibus Hugone Episcopo Aberdonensi, caeterisque Episcopis Scotiae, adstante Sacerdotum amplius septuaginta corona, qui laeti et omnibus Scotiae partibus advenerant, inter gaudium atque laetitiam septuaginta sex alumnorum, juxta ritus Sanctae Ecclesiae Catholicae feliciter postitus est, Admodum Revd. Aenea Canonico Chisholm, Legum Doctore Collegium regente. Ellis & Wilson, architectis. Roberto Buchan, aedificatore."

The following is a free translation of the document:-

On the 23rd July, 1896, in the 18th year of the Pontificate of Pope Leo XIII., and 60th year of Queen Victoria's reign (whom may God long prosper), this foundation stone of the new college of Blairs was laid in the presence of the bishops and priests of Scotland, of the superiors and students of the college, by the Bishop of St. Andrew's and Edinburgh, the Very Rev. Canon Chisholm, LL.D., being rector; Ellis & Wilson, architects; Robert Buchan, builder.

The signal was then given to Mr. Murray, the inspector of works, and in a few seconds the foundation stone was placed in

its position. The "Te Deum" was then sung.

## 17th August.—Opening of a New School at Dumfries.

This new School, the building of which was begun in June, 1895, was formally opened and taken possession of by the children and their teachers in August last. It is a large and commodious building of two stories, the ground floor of which is occupied by the Infant Department and the first floor by the Girls, who are in charge of the Sisters of Charity. The School provides accommodation for 500 children and has all modern convenience and appliances.

## 19th August.—Re-opening of Preshome Church, Enzie.

The church at Preshome, Enzie, was re-opened after the extension of the eastern gable and the erection of a new altar, presented to the Church by Very Rev. Canon Kyle, the pastor, on 19th August. The service began about half-past eleven, and was attended by many visitors from a distance, the building

being crowded. High Mass was sung by Canon Kyle, assisted by Rev. Donald Chisholm, Aberdeen, as Deacon, and Rev. J. Taylor, Motherwell, as Sub-Deacon, both of whom Canon Kyle had sent to College from his Enzie flock. The Bishop of the Diocese was

present along with a great number of Clergy.

After Mass, Bishop Macdonald gave a short address in reference to the re-opening. In it he said that the occasion was a very important one, the re-opening of a church in the Enzie, that in modern Catholicity was the most sacred place in the whole of Scotland. Since the Reformation, Enzie and Glenlivet had been nurseries from which bishops and priests had gone forth to the large centres of population. Confirmation was afterwards administered.

6th September.—Celebration of the Golden Jubilee of St. Alphonsus', Glasgow.

The Golden Jubilee of this Mission was celebrated on 6th September, 1896. Mass coram Episcopo was celebrated by the Very Rev. Canon Dyer, St. Mary's, assisted by Father Murray, Deacon, Father McEachen, Sub-Deacon. The sermon was preached by the Most Rev. Dr. Healy, Bishop of Clonfert, Co. Galway, Ireland. The congregation was large and representative, including many Protestant ladies and gentlemen. The sermon in the evening was preached by his Lordship Bishop Maguire. It is unique in the history of any Catholic church in Scotland, and of any other country, that two Bishops should preach on the same day, in the same church. The Patron is worthy of all the honour. The Chapter of the Archdiocese honoured the ceremony with their presence.

15th October.—Installation of the Carmelite Nuns at Oakley.

The 15th October, the Feast of St. Teresa, witnessed the solemn enclosure of a community of Carmelites from Lourdes. The mansion house at Fernwoodlea has been placed at their disposal by A. D. Smith-Sligo, Esq., of Inzievar, and at considerable outlay has been adapted to the requirements of a contemplative order of Nuns by the same generous benefactor. The religious are continuously occupied either in prayer or work, and owe their support largely to the sale of church embroidery, in which they are adopts. The convent chapel is now the public oratory for the district.





## II. ORDINATIONS.

The Rev. William F. Casey was born at Roy Bridge, Fort-William, on 28th October, 1869; entered Blairs College on 18th July, 1885, and after the usual course passed to the Scots College, Valladolid, 1st September, 1889. Compelled to leave Spain through ill-health, he returned home in May of 1893, and afterwards, on the 2nd of October of the same year, proceeded to Rome, but was again compelled to return home through ill-health in June of the following year, and entered St. Petor's College, New Kilpatrick, on 18th August, 1894. At Kinnoull received tonsure, minor orders, and the sub-diaconate at the hands of the Right Rev. J. Smith, Bishop of Dunkeld, on 11th August, 1895; diaconate, on the Feast of the Assumption, and priesthood, on the 26th of the same month, at the hands of the Right Rev. W. Turner, D.D., Bishop of Galloway.

The Rev. CHARLES ED. FLEMING was born at Gateshead, England, 29th April, 1869. He attended the Grammar School, Newcastle-on-Tyne; and entered Blairs, 24th August, 1883. He left Blairs in ill-health in 1885, and returned again in 1886. He was sent to the Petite Communauté, Paris, in 1887, and to the Grand Seminaire at Issy in 1890; and after six weeks there passed on to Rome to the Scots College in that city. He received the tonsure in the Church of St. Apollinare from Cardinal Parrochi, 23rd July, 1893; first two minor orders in Cardinal Parrochi's private chapel, 25th July, 1893; last two minor orders also from the same Prelate 10th December, 1893; the sub-diaconate in the Church of Propaganda on the Feast of All Saints, 1894; the diaconate in the Church of SS. Quaranta on the 8th of December, 1894. All the above orders were received at the hand of Cardinal Parrochi. He was ordained priest in the church of St. John Lateran by Archbishop Stonor, 8th June, 1895. He left Rome for Scottish Mission 10th June, 1896; and after being for a short time chaplain at Westthorn Reformatory, Dalbeth, Glasgow, he passed on to St. Mary's, Greenock, 28th September, 1896.

The Rev. WILFRID GETTINS was born at Maryhill, 5th March, 1868; studied classics at St. Benedict's Monastery, Fort-

Augustus, and St. Edmund's College, Douai; philosophy at Prior Park, Bath; and theology at St. Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, where he received minor orders at the hands of Bishop Maguire in December, 1895. He was ordained subdeacon and deacon at Oban on 29th February and 19th March respectively, and priest at Rothesay on 25th March, 1896, by Bishop Smith of Argyll and the Isles. After his ordination he was appointed assistant priest at Rothesay.

The Rev. Andrew Grant was born at Auchindryne, Braemar, on the 24th of February, 1869. Entering Blairs College on the 20th of July, 1883, he was sent to complete his classics under the Jesuit Fathers of the Rue Vaugirard, Paris, in October, 1886. From thence he passed to the Scots College, Rome. He received the tonsure from Mgr. Lenti in 1891 in the Church of St. John Lateran, and the minor orders from Cardinal Parocchi in his private chapel in the course of the same year. He was by the same prelate ordained sub-deacon on the 23rd September, 1893, deacon on St. Andrew's Day, and priest on All Saints' Day of the following year, in the College Church of Propaganda. He returned to Scotland in May, 1895, and was stationed at the Cathedral, Aberdeen.

The Rev. C. P. Grau was born at Eil, Archdiocese of Cologne, on the 11th January, 1865. He studied classics in St. Charles' College, Valkenburg, philosophy in Rollduc, near Aix-la-Chapelle, Rhineland, and entered St. Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, on the 19th September, 1893. He received minor orders on the 8th December, 1895; was ordained sub-deacon on 24th May, deacon on the 4th June, and priest on the 14th of the same month. After supplying for a short time at Shieldmuir, he was appointed as third assistant at St. Mirin's, Paisley, on the 6th November, 1896.

The Rev. John Kilcullen was born in Dundee 21st May, 1871; entered Blairs in the year 1885, from whence he passed, after four years' study, to the College of the Propaganda, Rome, 4th October, 1889. He received the tonsure from Archbishop Lenti, 5th April, 1891; first two minor orders from Cardinal Parrochi, 25th March, 1893; the other two minor orders from the same Prelate, 4th February, 1894. He received sub-diaconate on the 25th July, 1894, from Cardinal Parrochi in the Sominario Pio, and on the 1st of November of that year he also received the diaconate from the same cardinal in the Propaganda Collego. He was raised to the priesthood in St. John Lateran's, 30th March, 1895. He is at present stationed in St. Mary's, Powrie Place, Dundee.

The Rev. Andrew Lynch was born in Glasgow 8th February, 1870. He entered Blairs, 8th August, 1884, and passed to the

Petite Communauté des Clercs de St. Sulpice, Paris, 3rd October, 1888. He entered St. Peter's College, Partick, 8th January, 1890, and received in the College Church from Bishop Maguire tonsure, 21st December, 1894, minor orders, 22nd December, 1894, sub-diaconate, 9th March, 1895, diaconate, 25th March, 1895, and the priesthood on Pentecost Sunday, 2nd June, 1895, in St. Andrew's Cathedral, Glasgow. After serving three months at Barrhead, he was stationed in St. Mary's, Greenock.

The Rev. ALEXANDER MACDONALD was born at Bohuntine in Lochaber on the 29th December, 1869. He entered St. Mary's College, Blairs, on the 21st August, 1885; and was transferred to Scots College, Valladolid, on 1st September, 1889. He received the tonsure and minor orders on the 22nd December, 1893, and was ordained sub-deacon on the following day, and deacon on St. Stephen's Day, 26th December of same year. He was raised to the priesthood on Passion Sunday, 31st March, 1895, by the Most Rev. Antonio Maria Caseajares y Azara, Archbishop of Valladolid, from whom also he had received the other orders. He returned to Scotland on 23rd April, and was appointed assistant at St. Michael's, Parkhead, Glasgow. He is now Chaplain at Westthorn Reformatory.

Rev. James Macdonald was born in Glasgow in the year 1872; went to Blairs College on 18th August, 1885, and after doing the usual studies there passed to the Petit Seminaire de St. Sulpice at Issy. After a two years' course of classics he entered St. Peter's, Partickhill, in August, 1891, and finished his studies in St. Peter's, New Kilpatrick, in June, 1896. The dates of his ordination are as follows: tonsure on the 7th, and the four minor orders on the 8th December, sub-diaconate on the 24th May, diaconate on the 4th, and priesthood on the 14th, June. He was appointed one of the assistant priests at Maryhill.

Rev. Francis Macmanus was born at Edinburgh in 1869; entered Blairs College in 1884, whence, after the usual course, he was sent to France. Having pursued the customary philosophical and theological studies there, he received tonsurer, minor orders, sub-diaconate and diaconate at the hands of his Eminence Cardinal Richard. Archbishop of Paris. He was ordained priest on Trinity Saturday, 1895, by the Right Rev. Monsignor de Forges. On his return to Scotland, having laboured for some time in various parishes, he was stationed at St. Mary's Cathedral, Edinburgh.

The Rev. Denis McBrearty was born at Dumbarton, 30th July, 1872. He entered Blairs College, August, 1886, and Petite Communauté des Clercs de St. Sulpice, Issy, Paris, October, 1889. He was recalled to the Seminary, Partick, August 1891.

Received tonsure 7th December, and the four minor orders 8th December, 1895; sub-diaconate 24th May, 1896, diaconate 4th June, and priesthood on 14th June, 1896. He is stationed at St. Peter's, Partickhill, Glasgow.

The Rev. Joseph M'Lellan was born at Tomintoul, 28th February, 1871. On 16th August, 1885, he went to St. Mary's College, Blairs, and thence, after a sojourn of four years, he passed to the Scots College, Valladolid, where he finished his classical studies. In May, 1892, he entered the Sulpician Seminary at Issy to study philosophy, and continued his course of theology under the Fathers of the same order in the Seminary of St. Sulpice, Paris. He was ordained sub-deacon at Christmas, 1895, deacon at Trinity of the following year, in the Church of St. Sulpice, Paris, and finally was raised to the priesthood in St. Mary's Cathedral, Aberdeen, on the 26th July, 1896. He is now stationed as junior clergyman at St. Peter's, Aberdeen.

The Rev. ALEXANDER Jos. M'MILLAN was born in Glasgow, and entered Blairs College on 14th August, 1886. In October, 1890, he was sent to the Petite Communaute at Issy, Paris. Having there completed his preparatory studies, he was transferred in the following year to the Seminary of Philosophy. In 1892 he went to St. Kieran's College, Kilkenny, Ireland, where he read his theological course. He received tonsure and minor orders on 7th April, 1896, sub-diaconate on 12th April, diaconate on 31st May; and was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. Dr. Brownrigg, Bishop of Ossory, on 29th June, 1896. On returning to Scotland he was sent to supply for a short time a vacancy in St. Mary's, Dundee; afterwards was appointed assistant to the Very Rev. Canon Butti of St. Patrick's in the same city.

The Rev. Patrick Morrison was born at Boisdale, South Uist, on the 3rd of March, 1871. He entered Blairs College on 6th August, 1885, and was transferred to Valladolid on 1st September, 1889. After studying rhetoric and philosophy there he had to come home in ill-health in July, 1892. After spending a year at home he entered St. Peter's Seminary, New Kilpatrick, where he studied theology. Called to Oban in March of this year, he received tonsure on the 22nd, minor orders on the 24th, and sub-diaconate on the 25th March; he was raised to the diaconate 14th April, and to the priesthood on the Ascension, the 23rd of May—all at the hands of his own Bishop, the Right Rev. Geo. J. Smith, Bishop of Argyll and the Isles.

The Rev. John Stuart was born at Braes of Glenlivet on the 16th March, 1870. He entered Blairs College in August, 1884, and

Scots College, Rome, in October, 1888. He returned to Scotland in 1895, and was appointed assistant at Lennoxtown.

The Rev. John Stuart was born in Dundee, 30th December 1871; entered Blairs College, 20th September, 1887; passed to the Seminary of Issy in October, 1892, and to that of St. Sulpice in October, 1894. He received the tonsure from Mgr. de Forges on the 21st December, 1895, and minor orders on the 30th May, 1896, from Mgr. de la Passadière, in Paris. He was ordained sub-deacon on the 15th, and deacon on 22nd, November; and priest on the 6th December, 1896, in St. Joseph's, Dundee, by Bishop Smith of Dunkeld. He has been appointed assistant at St. Joseph's, Dundee.

The Rev. Joseph Thomson was born at Fochabers on the 11th September, 1872. He entered Blairs College on the 5th of August, 1886, and two years later was removed to Scots College, Rome. Towards the end of the year 1892 he received the tonsure at the hands of Mgr. Lenti, and the other minor orders at the hands of Cardinal Parocchi. He received the sub-diaconate from Cardinal Parocchi in the Church of the Propaganda College on the Feast of All Saints. Six weeks later he received the diaconate; and finally on All Saints' Day, 1895, he was raised to the priesthood by the same Cardinal. Having been called home in July of the following year, he was stationed at the Cathedral, Aberdeen.

The Rev. James Urquhart was born in Inverness on the 22nd July, 1873. He entered Blairs College, August, 1885, and was transferred to the Petite Communauté in October, 1889. He entered Issy for philosophy, October, 1891, where he received the tonsure, 26th May, 1893. In October of the same year he entered St. Sulpice, Paris, for theology. He received the minor orders from Cardinal Richard, 19th May, 1894; sub-diaconate from Bishop de Forges, 21st December, 1895; diaconate, 30th May, 1896, from Cardinal Richard; and was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. Hugh Macdonald, C.SS.R., Bishop of Aberdeen, in St. Mary's Cathedral in that city on the 26th July, 1896. He is at present one of the clergymen of St. Patrick's, Coatbridge.

The Rev. George Wiseman was born at Deskie, Glenlivet, on the 19th November, 1867. He entered Blairs College on the 28th July, 1883, and in 1886 was removed to the Petite Communauté, Paris. Having finished classics there and at the Jesuit College of Vaugirard, he passed to the Urban College of Propaganda, Rome, in 1889. Tonsure and minor orders were conferred at various periods before the end of 1894. He received the sub-diaconate from Cardinal Parocchi on the 26th July, 1894, in the Collegio Pio, and the diaconate on All Saints' Day of the same year in the Propaganda College Chapel. Having been called home, he was raised to the priesthood in St. John Lateran's, Passion Sunday, 1895, by Mgr. Stonor, Archbishop of Trebizond. For a time he was stationed at the Cathedral, Aberdeen, and is now in charge of the mission of Portsoy.





### III. OBITUARY.

Pray for the soul of the Very Rev. WILLIAM CANON CAVEN, who died at St. Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, on the 1st March, 1896, in the 73rd year of his age, and the 48th year of his priesthood.

Canon Caven was born at Paisley on 11th October, 1823. His early boyhood was passed at Achinhalrig in Banfishire, where his uncle and namesake, the Rev. William Caven, was the resident priest. At the age of eleven he entered Blairs College. On the testimony of one of his professors, a venerable priest still living, he was even then remarkable for his quiet, gentle disposition—a characteristic which he retained through life. In 1840 he was sent to the Scots College, Rome, where he spent eight years. At that time there was a number of brilliant students in the college. He held his own among them in carrying off University prizes and honours, especially in Mathematics, during the course of philosophy, and later on in Moral Theology. Yet, in his case, success arose not so much from the brilliancy of his talents as from the solidity of his judgment. and the diligence with which he pursued his studies. His best record is, that he left behind him the name of a model studentpious, a hard worker, a strict observer of rule, and an invariably amiable companion. He was ordained priest on 8th April, 1848, and shortly after returned to Scotland. It is not too much to say that Canon Caven then became a pattern of the priestly life to all his brethren. His work, lying as it did mostly in lines hidden from the public view, never brought him into prominence; yet, such was the force of his example, that it commanded the veneration of all who came to know him even slightly.

By a remarkable coincidence, his career as a priest was divided into three periods of sixteen years each. From 1848 to

1864 he was professor at Blairs. In after years he often recalled with pleasure the work of those years, and the time spent there along with the late Archbishop Strain, the Rev. William Mann, and Dr. Macdonald, now Rector at Valladolid, as his fellow-professors. In a college there are many duties lying outside the professorial work itself. Canon Caven had his full share of these. He had the charge of training the students in the ceremonies of High Mass, and other solemn functions. To him also was committed the supervision of the workshop and the grounds. Here his mathematical and mechanical skill proved to be of great avail. It was on his plans, and under his direction, that the students laid out their gardens and bounds in their present form. In 1863 Canon Caven's health broke down, and he had to be relieved of his arduous work as professor. After recruiting for some months at Preshome in the Enzie, he was, at the urgent request of Dr. Murdoch, transferred from the Northern District, and was by him appointed Chaplain to the Franciscan Nuns in Glasgow—a post which he held until 1880. He entered upon his new duties with the unobtrusive but telling zeal that was so characteristic of him. He never spared himself in the service of the Sisters. His time and talents were devoted to their spiritual and temporal interests. The Franciscan Nuns at that time were weighed down by a heavy debt of £6000. In 1886 Canon Caven, with the help of some friends, organised a lottery, which cleared off £5000. The burden of the correspondence fell upon him and sorely taxed his strength. Later, in 1871, a bazaar, which he set on foot, realised over £1000. After these pecuniary difficulties had been removed. Canon Caven ever found fresh outlets for his zeal on behalf of the Sisters. He was their adviser, faithful and true, in all their business transactions. He aided them to the utmost of his power in their task of educating the boarders and pupils committed to their care. His skill in drawing plans was ever ready to improve and extend their buildings. But what most gained him the confidence and veneration of the nuns was his skill as a prudent director of conscience in the path of perfection. For years after he ceased to be their chaplain he continued to hear their confessions and guide them in the spiritual life. Other communities also availed themselves of his direction.

In 1880 Canon Caven was appointed Rector of St. Peter's College. He also held there the chairs of Moral Theology and Mathematics, two subjects which he had pursued with predilection from his student days. He continued to teach Moral Theology till within three years of his death. He also gave at stated intervals lectures on the Rubrics, in which he was an acknowledged authority. As Rector, Canon Caven won the full confidence of his students. The soul of honour himself, his one aim was to make the principle of duty, as implied in the voca-

tion to the priesthood, the sole rule of their life in college. Yet he never expected absolute perfection from them. According to one who knew him well, "he never tried to knock in a nail where it would not go". He pursued his purpose of improvement steadily, but without hurry or impatience; he was content with the best that could be hoped for at the time and waited quietly for the rest. This accounts for the affection, mingled with a certain awe, which he inspired in all his students. One striking event of his Rectorship was the transference of St. Peter's College from Partickhill to the splendid building erected at New Kilpatrick, by the munificence of His Grace the Archbishop of Glasgow.

Canon Caven did a great deal of silent but important work outside the duties of his post. He was employed on several boards connected with the administration of the Archdiocese. For many years he was the Registrar for the deceased Brethren. He was also for a long period the Superintendent of the diocesan Industrial Schools, in connection with which a great amount of work devolved upon him. On the erection of the Cathedral Chapter, he was made the Canon Theologian. This honour was an undoubted tribute to his solid and extensive knowledge of sacred science, as well as to his unblemished and holy life. His brother Canons elected him to be their Secretary, and later, when on account of his increasing infirmities, he had to be relieved of the duty of attending their meetings, the whole Chapter paid a touching tribute to his worth by a common letter expressive of their veneration for him. For fear that in his humility he would suppress the letter, it was sent to the professors to be read before it was handed over to him.

Canon Caven's health was slowly undermined by a painful illness for years before his death. No one that witnessed it will forget the edification given by his Christian patience and fortitude. He died on 1st March, 1896. The funeral service took place in St. Andrew's Cathedral, four days after, amidst a great gathering of clergy and laity, some coming from distant parts of Scotland, notwithstanding the inclemency of the season. The professors of St. Peter's College officiated at the Requiem Mass, in the presence of the Cathedral Chapter. A touching panegyric was preached by the Very Rev. Canon Macfarlane of Partick. The Absolutions were given by an old and intimate friend of the deceased—the Very Rev. Canon Condon, who also officiated at Dalbeth Cemetery. To their great regret, Archbishop Eyre and Bishop Maguire were both prevented from attending by illness.

Canon Caven seems to have modelled his life on the words of the Imitation: Ama nesciri et pro nihilo reputari. He possessed accomplishments little suspected till closer acquaintance with him brought them out. His humility made him diffident of himself and of his opinions to a degree that was sometimes embarrassing. Without guile, and gentle, he possessed a manly straightforwardness that was tempered with tact. Under his unpretending exterior there lay a great soul, ever ready to do or to suffer without any regard to petty or selfish considerations. With him has passed away one who in all truth was "a simple and upright man and fearing God."

The following notice of this venerable priest is taken from

The Melbourne Advocate of the 19th Sept., 1896:-

We regret to have to announce the death of the Rev. Duncan McNab, which occurred at St. Ignatius' Presbytery, Richmond. on the 11th inst. The deceased priest was born in the Highlands of Scotland in 1820, and, consequently, was in his 76th year at the time of his death. His father was a convert from Presbyterianism. Fr. McNab pursued his earlier studies at the parochial school, Aberdeen, and went through a complete course of philosophy and theology at the Scots College, Rome, and was ordained priest in 1845. He completed his sacerdotal golden jubilee last year. His first missionary labours were at Airdrie, Scotland, and in 1867 the rev. gentleman left his native country for Australia, where he commenced his priestly duties in the same year at Portland. Shortly afterwards Fr. McNab was appointed to Bendigo. He had charge of the Woodstock Church, which is served from St. Kilian's pro-Cathedral, and many of the residents of that farming district will regret to hear of his demise. The deceased clergyman did not remain very long attached to Bendigo after its creation into an episcopal see, and set out for Western Australia to convert the aboriginals, and afterwards to Northern Queensland for the same purpose. Here it was that he received a severe sunstroke, which ultimately caused his death. He never properly recovered from the effects of this attack, and was subject to fainting fits-his pulse going as low as thirty at different times. The rev. gentleman was a ripe Gaelic scholar, and delivered a lecture in Edinburgh on the Birthplace of St. Patrick, in which he sought to prove that the Apostle of the Irish race was born in Scotland. The lecture was afterwards published in pamphlet form, and had a a fair circulation, a considerable number of copies being disposed of in Sandhurst. Finding his health giving way, Fr. McNab abandoned the idea of spending his days amongst the aboriginal tribes, and paid a visit to Bendigo for the purpose of raising funds for others to carry on the missionary work in Northern Queensland. He delivered several sermons in St. Kilian's pro-Cathedral in furtherance of the object, and spoke in

praiseworthy terms of the high moral standard which obtained amongst the aboriginals. The last years of the rev. gentleman's life have been spent with the Jesuit Fathers at St. Ignatius', Richmond. The remains were placed in the church, and were visited by the congregation and the school children, to whom he had endeared himself by his genial nature.

THE OBSEQUIES.—On Monday morning, at 10:30 a.m., there was a very large congregation, when the Office for the Dead and Requiem High Mass were said for the repose of his soul. The Archbishop of Melbourne, who was attended by the Right Rev. Monsignor O'Hea and the Very Rev. T. Kenny, S.J., superior of the Irish-Australian Mission, presided in the sanctuary.

At the conclusion of the Office Fr. Cahill, S.J., sang Requiem High Mass coram archiepiscopo; deacon, Dean Hegarty; subdeacon, Fr. Phelan; master of ceremonies, Fr. Quinn. After which the Archbishop, vested in black cope and white mitre,

pronounced the final absolution at the catafalque.

His Grace said that in the death of Fr. McNab they had lost a zealous and holy priest, whose whole life had been given up to God. The deceased priest had enjoyed length of years, all of which had been devoted to the noble work of the salvation of souls. All his life he proved himself to be a true Israelite, and was indeed without guile. Fr. McNab was born in Scotland, and soon after his ordination he came out to this country, where he laboured in the vineyard of the Lord for a number of years. However, he soon turned his eyes towards the forlorn condition of the aboriginals, and by his zealous labours was the means of bringing numbers of them to the knowledge of God. alone knew of the untold good effected by the labours of Fr. McNab, as the seed of the Gospel spread broadcast by the deceased priest would go on fructifying amongst the aboriginals; just as in America, where the Jesuits had planted the faith amongst the Indians, and returned after generations, they found the seed planted in the distant past still bearing fruit, and flourishing amongst those people. The amiableness and kindheartedness of Fr. McNab had endeared him to the people amongst whom his lot was cast, and nothing but kind recollections and regret, he (the Archbishop) felt sure, would be entertained for the deceased priest that day. The ceremony in which they had taken part had a lesson which all would do well to lay to heart. The departed soul said to those left behind, "To-day for me; to-morrow for you". We should live a life in preparation for death, and continually ask God for the grace of a happy death. As very few were admitted into heaven immediately after their death, but had to suffer some temporal punishment before enjoying the beatific vision, it was the duty of all to pray for the soul of the deceased priest. If they in their charity remembered the departed soul, that soul would not be unmindful of its benefactors before the judgment seat of God.

bishop concluded by an earnest prayer to the Almighty for the repose of the soul of the deceased priest, and of all the souls

of the faithful departed.

The funeral procession was then formed, whilst the "Dead March in Saul" was played on the organ. The carriages of the Archbishop and of Mgr. O'Hea preceded the hearse to the General Cemetery, where the burial service was read in the presence of about thirty priests.

Syro-Chaldaic -Syro-Maronite -

The number (according to that list) of Patriarchs, Primates, Archbishops, and Bishops, on Jan. 1, 1896, including those who were retired, and including also Archbishops and Bishops of Titular Sees, was 1296.

NOTE.—Titular Sees, formerly called Sees in partibus infidelium (that is, in infidel regions), are, for the most part, assigned to Archbishops and Bishops appointed, either to Apostolic Delegations, Vicariates, or Prefectures; or to the office of Coadjutor, Auxiliary, or Administrator of a Diocese.

#### II. THE SOVEREIGN PONTIFF.

HIS HOLINESS POPE LEO XIII. (VINCENT JOACHIM PECCI), the 257th normal Pontiff, was born at Carpineto, March 2, 1810: consecrated Archbishop of Dumietta, Feb. 19, 1843; translated to the See of Perugia, Jan. 19, 1846; proclaimed Cardinal, Dec. 19, 1853; elected Pope, Feb. 20, crowned March 3, 1878.

#### III. THE SACRED COLLEGE OF CARDINALS.

The Cardinals, as the advisers and assistants of the Sovereign Pontiff, are the supreme council or senate of the Church; and, on the death of the Pontiff, they elect his successor.

There are three orders of Cardinals, Bishops, Priests, and Deacons. These orders are distinct from those of the Hierarchy: with few exceptions, the Cardinal Priests are archbishops or

bishops; and the Cardinal Deacons are generally priests.

The Sacred College, when complete, consists of 70 members: 6 Cardinal Bishops, whose dioceses are the six 'Suburban Sees'; 50 Cardinal Priests, whose 'titles' are the 'Titular Churches,' of which they are appointed superiors, with jurisdiction and right to a throne, etc., therein; and 14 Cardinal Deacons, who are appointed to the churches called 'Deaconries'.

The first Cardinal Bishop is *Dean*, the first of the Priests is *First Priest*, and the first of the Deacons is *First Deacon*, of the Sacred College. The Dean has the right of consecrating, and the First Deacon the right of proclaiming and crowning, a new Pope. On the death of the Pontiff the Cardinal *Camerlengo* has the

administration of the public affairs of the Holy See.

The 'creation' of a Cardinal sometimes precedes, even by several years, the 'publication' or proclamation. The Cardinal is then said to be 'reserved *in petto*,' and, when proclaimed, he takes precedence according to date of creation.

Besides the 130 residential Archiepiscopal and Episcopal Sees, 25 of the 29 Vicariates-Apostolic, are held or administered by

Bishops of titular Sees.
Four Episcopal Sees, four Vicariates-Apostolic, and three Prefectures are vacant. Including 15 Coadjutors and Bishops-Auxiliary, the number of Archbishops and Bishops now holding office in the British Empire is 166. There are also a few retired, or without episcopal office, of whom two are in England.

#### CATHOLIC POPULATION OF THE EMPIRE.

The estimated Catholic population of the United Kingdom is nearly 5 millions and a half: namely, England, 1,500,000; Scotland, 365,000; Ireland (according to the Census of 1891), 3,549,956. Including British America (with a Catholic population of about 2,600,000), Australia, India, and all other possessions, the total Catholic population of the British Empire is probably about 10 millions and a half.

#### POSTAL INFORMATION.

#### INLAND RATES.

Not above 1 oz., 1d.; not above 2 oz., 1½d.; and ½d. for each additional 2 oz., or part of 2 oz., and so on without limit at the rate of ½d. for every 2 oz., plus 1½d. for the first 2 oz.

The charge for re-direction of letters has been abolished.

#### REGISTERED LETTERS AND PARCELS.

On payment of the following fees any inland letter, newspaper packet, or parcel on which the postage has been prepaid in stamps, may be registered. It should be handed in to an agent of the P.O. and a receipt obtained, and on no account should a Registered Letter be dropped into a letter-box. The P.O. will not undertake the safe transmission of valuable enclosures in unregistered letters; and all letters found to contain coin, watches, or jewellery, will, on delivery, be charged a registration fee of 8d. Envelopes for Registered Letters are to be had for 2½d., or 12 for 2s. 2½d., including fee for Registration. The registration fees and limits of compensation are as follows:—Fee, 2d., Limit of Compensation, £5; 3d., £10; 4d., £15; 5d., £20; and 6d., £25. These charges do not include postage, which must be added.

#### LETTERS TO COLONIES AND FOREIGN COUNTRIES.

To all parts of the world outside the United Kingdom, the letter postage is  $2\frac{1}{2}$ d, the half-oz.; but in a few places an additional charge is made on delivery.

#### NEWSPAPER POSTAGE.

The postage on any registered newspaper through the United Kingdom is One Halfpenny, and a packet containing any number of newspapers up to 14 lbs. weight can be forwarded at ordinary book-post rates.

Newspaper wrappers are sold in small quantities, and also in bundles of 120 for 5s. 84d.

#### BOOK AND CIRCULAR POSTAGE.

A Book Packet, if not exceeding two ounces, One Halfpenny and for every additional 2 oz., ½d. Maximum weight, 5 lbs.

#### INLAND PATTERN AND SAMPLE POST.

This post is absolutely restricted to bona fide trade patterns and samples. 4 oz. are charged 1d.; 4 to 6oz., 1½d.; 6 to 8 oz., 2.

#### POST CARDS.

Post cards, bearing a halfpenny impressed stamp, are available for transmission between places in the United Kingdom, only. They are sold at ten for  $5\frac{1}{2}$ d., or of finer quality, ten for 6. They can also be had in smaller numbers or singly. Reply Cards are now sold.

Letter Cards have recently been introduced, and are sold at eight for 9d. Smaller numbers in proportion.

Foreign Postal Cards, 1d.; reply, 2d.

#### POST-OFFICE TELEGRAPHS.

The charge is 6d. for the first 12 words and ½d. per word thereafter. Addresses are charged for.

#### POST-OFFICE MONEY ORDERS.

Money may now be sent by Telegraph Money Order at the following rates: For sums not exceeding £1, 4d.; £1 to £2, 6d.; £2 to £4, 8d.; £4 to £7, 10d.; £7 to £10, 1s.

In addition to the commission a charge is made at the ordinary inland rate for the official telegram of advice and its repetition.

#### POSTAL ORDERS

For certain fixed sums are issued at all Post Offices at which Money Order business is transacted.

Charge, ½d. 1d. 1½d.

For 1/-, 1/6; 2/-, 2/6, 3/-, 3/6, 4/-, 4/6, 5/-, 7/6, 10/-, 10/6; 15/-, 20/-. Odd amounts may be sent with the extra Stamps affixed on face. A Crossed Postal Order can be made payable only through a bank, and if banker's name is mentioned payment will be made only through that banker. Postal Orders are not negotiable.

#### POST-OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.

No deposit of less than a shilling is received, nor any pence, and not more than £30 in one year. No further deposit is allowed when the amount standing in depositor's name amounts to £200 inclusive of interest. Interest is allowed at the rate of 2½ per cent.

(or sixpence in the pound) per annum-that is, at the rate of one

halfpenny per pound per month.

At every Post Office in the United Kingdom forms for making small deposits are issued gratuitously. Each form has twelve divisions, in each of which a penny postage stamp can be placed; when the twelve are filled in, it is received at any Post Office Savings Bank as a shilling.

Any person can invest, at any Post Office Savings Bank, small sums in Government Stock. Not more than £100 can be invested in any one year. The amount held by the investor must not exceed

£300.

#### INLAND PARCEL POST.

The Maximum Weight is 11 lbs., and costs 1s. 6d. 1 lb., 3d.; 2 lbs., 4½d.; and 1½d. per lb. beyond that up to 11 lbs.

When the original Inventory was recorded after 1st June, 1881, the 44 Vict. Cap. 12, Sec. 41, provides that the one per cent. Legacy and Succession Duty payable by children and others, under the Legacy and Succession Duty Act, is not payable in respect of any personal property included in the Inventory, and on which the Stamp duty has been paid (Sec. 41). This does not apply to Legacies or Successions out of heritable property or out of foreign assets, or to heritable property; nor does it apply to the duties payable by the other relatives of the deceased or strangers in blood: the Legacy and Succession Duties payable by those persons remain the same.

Sec. 42 of the above Act charges pecuniary legacies and shares of residue below £20 in value, where the deceased died on or after 1st June, 1881, with the duty imposed by the Legacy Duty Acts, subject to the relief granted by Sec. 13 of the 43 Vict. Cap. 14, and "as modified by this Act" (See Secs. 33 and 36).

Sec. 38, Sub Section 2, charges with duty "any property taken as a donatio mortis causa made by any person dying on or after the 1st day of June, 1881, or taken under a voluntary disposition, made by any person so dying, purporting to operate as an immediate gift inter vivos whether by way of transfer, delivery, declaration of trust or otherwise, which shall not have been bond fide made three months before the death of the deceased".

<sup>\*</sup> This applies only to lawful children of the deceased, illegitimate children being subject to Duty at the rate of 10 per cent.

Sec. 11 of 52 Vict. Cap. 7, amends Sub Sec. 2 of Section 38 of 44 Vict. Cap. 12, by substituting "twelve" months in place of "three" months before the death of the deceased, and "the description of property shall include property taken under any gift whenever made, of which property bona fide possession and enjoyment shall not have been assumed by the donee immediately upon the gift and thenceforward retained to the entire exclusion of the donor, or of any benefit to him by contract or otherwise".
